

The Psalmist calls upon God to “Zakar” remember or bring to remembrance His Word. In this Psalm we see a contrast between those who love and keep Torah and the wicked who oppose and persecute the righteous and reject God’s Torah/teachings and instructions. However, in the end the blessings fall on those who keep His Torah, including His Feasts and His Shabbat.



Zayin Ancient Symbol – Weapon

The numerical value of Zayin is 7. As such it denotes the Spiritual values that were the purpose of Creation. God created the universe in six days and rested on the seventh, as it were. In the words of Maharal, the physical world is represented by the number 6-but Creation was not finished until there was a seventh day, a day of rest from the mundane, a day of involvement with the Godly. The Sabbath remains the eternal reminder that the vast and mighty universe cannot endure unless it is continuously permeated by the spiritual aspects represented by the 7, which is symbolic of God’s own essence.

- **Zayin stand not only for the spiritual purpose of the world’s Creation and God’s continuing guidance in all phases of Jewish life, but the letter Zayin conveys to man that the Omnipotent One will assure him success in his necessary endeavors for physical survival.**
- The Zayin may also be translated weapon. But it is not coincidence that the letter Zayin is the symbolic representative of both sustenance and armament. The two concepts are related to each other. The Zayin is

shaped like a spear, indicating that man’s sustenance is obtained by his struggle. Moreover, as R’ Hirsch points out, the word bread, is cognate with war, for the struggle for daily bread sometimes causes man to struggle against his fellow man for his existence.

Psalm 119:49-Key Word

Remember – Hebrew Strong’s #2142 – Zakar

- To Pierce, to impress (on the memory), to remember, to recollect, to mention, to record, to bring to remembrance, to declare, to recite, to proclaim, to commemorate.
- Sabbath-Rest from Struggle for Sustenance.
- The Sabbath counteracts the danger of being submerged in our earthly labor for livelihood, and defense. The commandment of the Sabbath reads” For six days you may labor and do all your work,. But the Seventh Day is the Sabbath for Hashem your God, on it you may do no work. Exodus 20:9
- Man’s constant struggle to gain mastery over Creation and to control his environment prevails during the weekdays. But with the beginning of the Sabbath, Israel ceases working and rests, relying completely on the Divine Provider. By refraining from human creativity on the Sabbath and recognizing that man’s power is derived from God, Israel pays solemn homage to the Creator. (Dayan Grunfield in The Sabbath)
- The word Sabbath comes from the Hebrew word “Shabbat” meaning “to cease” or “desist”. The primary meaning is that of cessation from all work.

Messianic Significance of the Sabbath
